

Madison County Soil Conservation District Business Plan

Organization

The Madison County Soil Conservation District is a corporate and political subdivision of Tennessee's state government, having the same geographic boundaries as those of Madison County, organized in accordance with the purposes, provisions, powers and restrictions set forth within the Tennessee Soil Conservation District Law 43-14-201 through 43-14-223.

Function

The District's function is to locate technical, financial and educational resources, from various sources, and to focus or coordinate these resources so that the natural resource conservation needs of private landowners in Madison County are met, and as a result improve the overall environment of the district.

We Serve

The District serves to conserve the soil, water and the related natural resources of private lands within the district by working with landowners, farmers, ranchers, wildlife advocates, conservationists, environmentalists, teachers, students, businesses, agencies, government officials, and the general public.

Why

The conservation of the district's soil, water and the related natural resources of private lands is essential for the overall health of its environment, the continued economic prosperity of the area, and the preservation of the various lifestyles fulfilled through the use of the district's natural resources.

Mission Statement

The District's ultimate goal is to improve the quality of life for all people of Madison County through the conservation of the county's soil, water, and the related natural resources by coordinating technical expertise, and financial assistance, to aid the many private landowners with the conservation of their soil, and other related natural resources.

Critical Natural Resource Issues:

1. The Poor Health of our Soils: The soil's lack of biological activity & diversity; the Soil's lack for good structure, & its low percentage of organic matter; the Soil's compromised chemistry.
2. The Excessive Erosion of **Soil** from Cropland on the private lands in Madison County.
3. The Degradation of **Water Quality** of Madison County's Rivers and Streams.
4. The Continued Decline in the Population of Various **Game Animals** in Madison County.
5. The Lack of **Natural Wetlands** in Madison County due to their Prior Conversion.
6. The Continued loss of **Prime Farmland** to commercial, industrial and residential development.

Statement of Intent (outcome) for each of the Natural Resource Issues.

<u>Natural Resource</u>	<u>Intended Outcome</u>
Soil	Improve soil health – physically, chemically, & biologically
Soil	Reduce soil erosion of cropland to 2T on 70% of HEL cropland.
Soil	Eliminate gully erosion from 10% of tracts having gully erosion.
Water	Reduce agricultural pollutants to the point where Madison County has at least one stream on the state's 303d list of problem streams due to agricultural runoff removed from the list.
Wildlife	Increase quail and rabbit populations by 100% over current levels.
Wetlands	Restore 30 % of agricultural prior converted and farmed wetlands to wetlands.
Prime Farmland	Reduce the rate of prime farmland conversion by 50%.
